Parcels should be marked "Parcel Post," and handed in at the counter of a Post Office.

Parcels sent to the Six Northern Counties of Ireland, or to Great Britain, are liable to Customs examination on arrival and must be accompanied by an adhesive Customs Declaration.

A Delivery Fee of 6d. is collected from the addressee of each parcel received from a country abroad (except Canada) when the contents thereof are not liable to Customs Duty.

A Certificate of Posting can be obtained at any Post Office in respect of an unregistered parcel.

EXPRESS DELIVERY SERVICE.

PACKETS (letters, etc., and parcels) admissible for conveyance by the ordinary post may be transmitted by this service on prepayment by means of Postal Stamps affixed to the packet at the following charges:—

FOR LOCAL DELIVERY (except Sunday, Good Friday, and Christmas Day.)

For the first mile or part of a mile from the office of delivery to the address 0

For every additional mile or part of a mile 3

(Ordinary Postage is not charged.)

On each Packet weighing more than 1 lb., a weight fee in addition of 3d. Under certain conditions special arrangements are made for the delivery of more than one packet.

FOR DELIVERY AFTER TRANSMISSION BY POST (except Sundays, Good Friday, Christmas Day, and Bank Holidays)

This service applies to the Six Northern Counties and Great Britain, except the portion regarding the guaranteeing deficiency in charges.

On Express packets for delivery in Éire full Ordinary Postage and Express Fee of 6d. for the first mile or part of mile from the office of delivery to the addressee, and 3d. for each additional mile or part of a mile.

On Express packets for delivery in Great Britain or Northern Ireland ordinary postage plus a flat Express Fee of 6d., irrespective of the distance from the office of delivery to the address.

If the sender is unaware of the correct charges but does not wish application for shortages to be made to the addressee he may guarantee the deficiency by endorsing the packet "Charges guaranteed" and adding his full name and address. The packet should, however, bear at least the minimum Express Fee and Postage

The arrangement by which charges are guaranteed by the sender applies only to packets posted in Éire for delivery in Éire.

In all cases of Express Delivery the sender is liable for the full charges.

SPECIAL DELIVERY OF POSTAL PACKETS IN ADVANCE OF THE ORDINARY POST AT THE REQUEST OF THE ADDRESSEE (except on Sundays, Good Friday, Christmas Day and Bank Holidays).

Provided the necessary application has been made, Postal Packets will be delivered in advance of the ordinary delivery to any person or firm on payment of the full Express Fee of 6d. per mile or part of a mile, and 3d. for every additional mile or part of a mile as for one packet and a further charge of 1d. for every 10 or less number of additional packets beyond the first.

Regular Delivery by Special Messenger can be arranged in the same way.

LETTERS OR POSTAL PACKETS (OTHER THAN PARCELS) FOR EXPRESS DELIVERY ON SUNDAYS AFTER TRANSMISSION BY POST.

In certain cities special arrangements are made for Sunday Express Delivery to other cities on payment of a special fee of 1s. (additional to the ordinary Postage and Express Fee).

Such letters should be endorsed: "For Sunday Express Delivery."

EXPRESS LETTERS BY TELEPHONE.

Express Letters not exceeding thirty words, including the address, may be telephoned to certain Post Offices where they are written down and delivered for the usual Express Delivery Fee. Should any one letter contain more than 30 words (including the address) each additional 30 words or part thereof is charged for as a separate Express Letter.

Ordinary letters may be telephoned for transmission by ordinary letter post at a charge of 2d. for each 30 words or part thereof in addition to the appropriate telephone fee.

REGISTRATION.

Minimum Fee 3d.

Packets for Registration should be stamped for the amount of the Postage and Registration Fee and the word "Registered" marked on the bottom left-hand corner.

When the Registration Fee is in excess of 3d. the amount of the fee should be noted after the word Registered.

A packet for Registration (except a

registered postcard, newspaper, or printed paper packet) must be made up in a reasonably strong cover appropriate to its contents and fastened with wax, gum or other adhesive matter, or it may be securely tied with string sealed with wax or the ends may be secured by lead or steel seals.

Advice of the delivery of a registered packet will be sent to the sender for the fee of 3d.

COMPENSATION FOR LOSS OR DAMAGE.

REGISTERED POSTAL PACKETS.—Compensation in respect of money of any kind (Coin, Bank Notes, Legal Tender Notes, Money and Postal Orders, Cheques, Stamps, etc.) will be paid only in those cases in which the money is enclosed in one of the Registered Letter envelopes sold by the Department and the packet is tendered for transmission by Registered Letter Post. The compensation paid in respect of coin, which must be packed in such a way that it cannot move about, will in no case exceed £5.

Compensation for damage to a packet sent by Registered Letter Post will be paid only in those cases in which the packet is conspicuously marked with the words "Fragile, with care."

UNREGISTERED PARCELS.—No compensation is paid in respect of money of any kind sent by Parcel Post, whether registered or unregistered, or in respect of jewellery (gold, silver, jewels, etc.) sent by parcel post unregistered.

In order to substantiate a claim for compensation in respect of the loss of a Parcel in the post a Certificate of Posting should be obtained by the sender when the parcel is posted.

REGISTERED POSTAL PACKETS—UNREGISTERED PARCELS AND EXPRESS POSTAL PACKETS.—In the case of a claim for damage or loss of contents the packet should be retained for inspection.

In the case of Bank Notes, Legal Tender Notes, Money and Postal Orders, Cheques, Bonds, and similar documents, particulars sufficient for their identification must be furnished.

RAILWAY LETTERS.

Letters not exceeding 3 ounces in weight will be accepted by the principal Railways both on week-days and Sundays for conveyance by the next available train or ship. They are accepted on Railway Omnibus Routes also.

Such letters should be taken to the Parcel Booking Office or the Passenger Booking Office of the Station of the Railways over which line they are to be sent. Those intended for conveyance by Railway Omnibus can be tendered to Bus Conductors at the starting points or at convenient stopping places en route. Ordinary Postage at the Inland Rate must be prepaid by means of stamps in the usual way. In addition a fee of 3d. is chargeable, which must be paid in cash.

Such letters may be called for by the addressee at the Station of address or if desired, will be transferred by the Railway Authorities to the nearest Post Office Letter Box.

LATE FEE LETTERS.

At many Offices, Letters for despatch after the ordinary hours of Collection may be posted on payment of a special Late Fee of ½d. It is desirable that such letters should be superscribed "Late Fee."

Late Fee Letters may also be posted in the letter boxes affixed to Mail Trains.

POSTE RESTANTE.

Travellers or strangers to a town may have Postal Packets addressed to them in care of any Post Office except a Town Sub-Office for a period not longer than three months. Such letters should be marked "To be called for" or "Poste Restante," and must not be addressed to initials, christian name only, or to a fictitious name.

TELEGRAMS (INLAND).

For telegrams originating and for delivery within Éire: One shilling for the first 9 words, and a penny for each additional word.

On Sundays, Good Friday and Christmas Day 6d. extra will be charged.

For Telegrams for delivery in any part of Great Britain or Northern Ireland the rate is 1s. 6d. for the first 12 words.

The Inland C.O.D. Service applies only to parcels posted in Éire for delivery in Éire.

By means of this service "Trade Charges" on goods sent by Parcel Post are collected from the addressee by the Post Office and the amount of each "Trade Charge" is remitted to the sender by means of a Money Order.

In this way customers are enabled to order goods of which the actual price is not known to them and payment is only made on receipt of the goods, whereas traders can promptly execute orders unaccompanied by cash, with a minimum of inconvenience to their clients and with considerable saving in Book-keeping costs.

Such parcels are accepted at Head Offices and certain Sub-Offices and Branch Offices for delivery at any place within Éire, and they may be registered or sent by Express Service under the same conditions as ordinary parcels.

A C.O.D. parcel must bear on its cover or on a label affixed thereto:—

1. The name and full address of the sender.
2. The words "Cash on Delivery" followed by the amount of the "Trade Charge," i.e., the sum to be collected from the addressee.
3. Postage stamps for ordinary postage and the necessary C.O.D. Fee (also, if necessary, Registration Fee or Express Delivery Fee).

The sender must also complete, in duplicate, a special form, obtainable from the Post Office, which form must be handed to the Post Office office with the parcel.

No alteration or erasing of the "Trade Charge" on either the form or the parcel is permissible.

Shooting.—

Firearms Act, 1925.—Firearm Certificates.

1. A £2 Certificate for a shot gun authorising the possession, use and carriage of the gun and the purchase and possession of ammunition therefor.
2. 5s. Certificates for the second and every subsequent shot-gun and the purchase and possession of ammunition therefor.
3. 5s. Limited Certificate for a shot gun and the purchase and possession of ammunition therefor—the issue of which is restricted to the occupiers of land for the purpose of killing animals or birds other than game on their own land.

4. 5s. Certificates for a rifle or a pistol or revolver authorising the possession, use and carriage with or without ammunition therefor.

The above Certificates are valid until the 31st day of July next after the grant thereof.

There are no short term Certificates.

Persons ordinarily resident in Éire should make application for the grant of Firearm Certificates to their local Garda Síochána Superintendent. Persons not ordinarily resident in Éire should make like application to the Secretary, Department of Justice, Government Buildings, Dublin.

Registered Firearm Dealer's Duty for one calendar year £1.

Wireless Licences.—12/6 a year for each set, including portable wireless receiving apparatus and motor car wireless sets.

The above licence covers a period of 12 calendar months from the 1st day of the month of issue and may be obtained at all Money Order Post Offices.

Free Wireless Receiving Licences are issued to registered Blind Persons.

HACKNEY AND TAXI FARES AND REGULATIONS

HACKNEY CARRIAGE, Etc., AND TAXI FARES AND REGULATIONS.

RATES and FARES to be demanded and taken for the use of Hackney Carriages and Cabriolets without Taximeters, within Ten Statute Miles of the General Post Office, in Dublin.

BY SET-DOWN.

For a drive from any place within the limits of the Boundary direct to any other place within the same 1 0

If called upon to stop in the course of a Set-down the driver must inform the hirer that, if he does so, an additional charge of Sixpence will be made for every stop; otherwise the demand of such extra fare to be illegal.

BY TIME.

For any time not exceeding Twenty Minutes, a Fare 1 0
Over Twenty Minutes, but not exceeding one hour, a Fare of 2 0
For every Half Hour commenced after the first hour, a Fare of 0 9

The Fares are applicable within or without the Boundary.

No driver is bound to proceed by the hour to any place situated beyond the circumference of a circle, the radius of which shall be a line of Three Statute Miles from the place of starting, but nevertheless with Ten Statute Miles from the General Post Office; nor to engage for a longer period than four hours except by agreement; but whenever any such agreement shall have been entered into, the hour fare shall continue in force for the extra time agreed upon.

BY DISTANCE.

For any distance not exceeding s. d.
one mile, a Fare of 1 0
For every half mile commenced after the first mile, a Fare of 0 3

Drivers are bound to bring back the hirer for a Fare of Threepence for each mile commenced on the return journey.

The distance as regards Fares to or from places within the Boundary, no matter at what part of it hired or discharged, shall be computed from the General Post Office.

Drivers detained in waiting beyond Ten Minutes (when returning with the hirer) to be paid for the whole period of detention at the rate of Sixpence for every quarter of any hour commenced.

RULES APPLICABLE TO ALL CASES OF HIRING.

1.—PASSENGERS.—Drivers shall not carry more passengers than their several vehicles are constructed for, allowing a space of sixteen inches for each adult, two children under the age of twelve years to count as one adult person.

2. LUGGAGE.—The conveyance of luggage shall be subject to the following provisions:—

- (a) No driver is bound to carry any article manifestly injurious to his vehicle.
- (b) With any Fare drivers may charge Twopence for each article of luggage and Sixpence for each bicycle or perambulator (such bicycle or perambulator to be carried at the option of the driver); the charge is to cover the whole period of the hiring, irrespective of the time or distance to which such hiring shall extend.
- (c) No small parcel, book, umbrella, or other article usually carried in the hand to be deemed luggage.

3. COMING FROM THE STAND.—Drivers, when required, shall be bound to proceed from the Stand to the residence of the hirer without any extra charge if the distance thereto shall not exceed one mile. If the distance exceeds one mile, or if the driver is sent away without being employed, he is entitled to the sum of One Shilling.

4. STARTING.—Drivers, if detained at the residence of the hirer for more than five minutes before starting, shall be paid for such detention at the rate of Sixpence for every quarter of an hour commenced.

5. PAYMENT OF FARE.—When alternative modes of hiring apply in any particular case, the option rests with the hirer at the expiration of the engagement.

6. One or more passengers are entitled to be carried for these Fares, which are the same either by day or by night.

REVISED FARES FOR MOTOR CABRIOLETS.

The RATES and FARES to be taken and demanded for the Hiring, within 10

statute miles of the General Post Office, Dublin, of a Motor Cabriolet fitted with a Taximeter, recording the fare by a combination of Time and Distance, shall be according to the following scale:—

- 1. For the first statute mile or any part thereof, by day or night s. d. 1 0
- 2. For each succeeding one-fourth of a mile or part thereof 0 3
- 3. For a time, if delayed on the journey by the hirer for every 2½ minutes (or fraction thereof registered by the Taximeter) 0 3
- 4. When the number of passengers exceeds two, an additional charge of sixpence for each additional passenger may be made; such charge must be registered on the Taximeter and cover the whole period of hiring, irrespective of time or distance 0 6
- 5. Drivers, if required, are bound to proceed from the Stand to the residence of the hirer for a distance not exceeding one statute mile free of charge, and if sent away without being hired shall be entitled to a fare of 2 0

6. No charge to be made when returning empty, unless the vehicle is employed within the prescribed Carriage Boundary of the City of Dublin and is driven to any place beyond six statute miles from the G.P.O., Dublin, when a charge of 2s. 6d. may be made as compensation for returning empty 2 6

7. Drivers, if detained at residence of hirer for more than 5 minutes before starting, shall be paid at the time rates as herein prescribed, after the lapse of 5 minutes.

PASSENGERS' LUGGAGE.

The conveyance of passengers' luggage shall be subject to the following provisions:—

- (a) A driver is not bound to carry any article manifestly injurious to his vehicle, or any article likely to be dangerous to passengers or the public.

- (b) Drivers may charge for each article of luggage not exceeding 50 lbs. in weight s. d. 0 2
- (c) For each article of luggage exceeding 50 lbs. in weight 0 6
- (d) For bicycles or perambulators 0 6
- (e) No small article of luggage such as despatch case, parcel, books, or other article ordinarily carried by the hand, shall be deemed luggage.
